Since 1991, Vision for Children at Risk has been a catalyst for positive change in the way the St. Louis region takes care of its children. VCR brings together child-serving agencies and community partners to build needed programs and services addressing critical needs of children.

Benefits delivered by Vision for Children at Risk to the St. Louis community include:

- A solid base of comprehensive, current and reliable data and information on children, including nine editions of the *Children of Metropolitan St. Louis (CMSL)* report, plus the soon-to-be-introduced Children's Policy Forum website that will provide greatly expanded data, information, commentary and best practices on children's services.
- Collaboration and communication among agencies around a regional strategic agenda for children through the St. Louis Metropolitan Children's Agenda involving some 300 agencies in over 25 strategies.
- New programs and initiatives serving tens of thousands of children and attracting over \$20 million in new funding to the region, would not exist without VCR and the Children's Agenda.
- A voice for children with business and civic leaders, engaging them to help advance children's issues. In addition, we have held six St. Louis Metropolitan Children's Summits bringing together hundreds of child-serving professionals and community leaders to call attention to the needs of children.

## Making Things Happen for Children ...

### 2009 St. Louis Metropolitan Children's Summit

Nearly 300 child-serving professionals, child advocates and community leaders attended the Dec. 9, 2009 St. Louis Metropolitan Children's Summit. The theme of the 2009 Summit was "Investing in Children Today to Build the Region's Future." Keynote speaker was Robert Dugger, chair of the Partnership for America's Economic Success, who discussed how smart investments in young children can improve the nation's economy. Civic Strategies, Inc., a nationally respected Atlanta-based firm, facilitated a panel discussion and afternoon breakout sessions on strategies for making St. Louis a region where children of all means receive strong support for their growth and development. Also at the Summit, breakout sessions were held on the six fundamental needs areas of the Children's Agenda (Family Support, Early Childhood, Quality Education, Maternal Child Health, Youth Development, Safe Neighborhoods & Strong Communities).

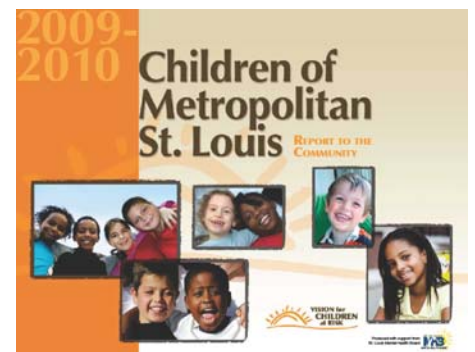

### Ninth Edition of Data Report on Children

Vision for Children at Risk believes in the importance of solid research in driving sound decision-making when it comes to children's services. This year we published the ninth edition the *Children of Metropolitan St. Louis* report containing comprehensive data on over 25 indicators of child well-being. The report is used extensively in developing program plans and writing grant applications. In addition, Vision for Children at Risk soon will introduce the Children's Policy Forum website, providing greatly expanded data search capabilities, as well as a library on best practices and local activities.



# Collaboration: Taking Strategic Action for Children

Vision for Children at Risk provides leadership to **develop new programs and policies** improving services to children. We coordinate the **St. Louis Metropolitan Children's Agenda**, through which some 300 agencies and organizations work together to design and implement new programs and services for children. Key accomplishments in the Children's Agenda include:

- In early childhood services, Vision for Children at Risk is providing staffing and support for four initiatives: the St. Louis Mayor's Strategic Plan for Early Childhood Success; Missouri Early Childhood Comprehensive Systems Plan (ECCS); P-20 and the Children's Zone. Focuses of these initiatives include quality standards for early childhood programs, developmental assessments of children at age 3 and kindergarten entry, and programs to increase young children's linkage with community resources.
- The St. Louis Family & Community Partnership achieved record participation in its April 2009 Child Abuse Prevention Month kickoff ceremony at St. Louis City Hall, and coordinated presentation of four half-day training sessions in the Strengthening Families program to help prevent child abuse, attended by over 200 child-serving professionals.



## Advocacy: Promoting Greater Civic Investment

Greater civic and community support is essential if we are to provide for the well-being of all children. Vision for Children at Risk works to engage business and civic leaders in children's initiatives. At the 2009 Children's Summit, over 50 civic leaders attended a breakfast presentation by Robert Dugger, chair of the Partnership for America's Economic Success. A follow-up effort is in process.
